

This is one of the main principles of collecting at the Museum. And it's something to keep in mind if you're ever thinking of offering something for donation.





Maybe someone's cleaning out their attic and found a collection of old political campaign buttons. Maybe a general contractor is working on a building and wants to preserve some historical element that is being removed. Maybe someone's great-grandmother has passed away and they're cleaning out her house and her (possibly) priceless art.


Whatever the reason for the outreach, we ask for a photo and a brief description of the artifact with some sense of its story and background.

Before you write about your heirloom, however, keep in mind that there are a couple of things we can't do. First, we can't do appraisals or in any way help you estimate what an object is worth. And second, we can't help you authenticate a piece. Think your aunt's

oil-on-canvas is a genuine Thomas Cole? We can't help you there!







- Can we exhibit it in the future?
- Does the object tell a story about our past or present?


We don't have the resources to accept certain objects, and we never take anything that we don't think we can take care of properly. We generally say "no" to exceedingly large arti-

facts—like pianos or big architectural elements—because we don't have the storage space or facilities to exhibit them.

And once we decide to accept your item, it becomes official. The donor fills out a deed of gift, and we formally take it into our collection.

What does the donor get in return? They can pick the object's credit line—either their own name or in honor of someone—so the piece always has that association. But more importantly, they have the satisfaction of knowing that a treasured object—and the story that goes with it—will be preserved for generations to come.

Old Maid's Hole

What we commonly call today, the Old Maid's Hole, was previously known as Best's Cavern and the Tyler Hole. Old Maid's Hole is located on the south side of Route 20, just to the west of the motel. It was called Best's Cavern because it was located on the Best farm. The underground stream goes under Route 20 and heads in a northeast direction until it spews out of the hillside "downstreet" just to the south of the present-day Beekman 1802 Mercantile by the old Klinkhart homestead. Through the years, people have explored the underground chasm, and on occasion, it is said ducks were put in the hole by the Route 20 crevasse to see them come out of the hillside where the water surfaces. The water is an overflow from Bowmaker's Pond and drains through the school property. Several times over the years, dirt, debris, and silt have blocked up the above-ground entrance which has caused flooding of Route 20 in front of Sharon Springs Central School. Today, the Village and the New York State Dept. of Transportation have the responsibility of keeping the opening clear to avoid flooding.







Sharon Springs Milk Bottles

The bottle on the left Is a Lehman milk bottle. Lehman's bottled milk on Kilts Road. The bottle in the middle is Moineau—which was located across from the current Library building. The bottle on the right reads Sharon Springs Creamery which may have come from the creamery behind the Railroad Depot.



Rabbit Goody, of Thistle Hill Weavers

... is a local mill owner and internationally known textile historian, researcher, lecturer, and teacher. Although technically she resides in the Town of Cherry Valley, we consider her a Sharon-ite. Rabbit recently assisted New York State Museum staff with identifying and rehousing its coverlet collection. There are 56 coverlets in the Museum's collection ranging in date from 1750 to 1880. Pictured is a double woven coverlet dated 1844 from Schoharie County. How proud and fortunate we are to have Rabbit.



Hollywood Hotel Demolished


Stewart's Shops, next to the Hollywood Hotel on Route 20, bought the Hollywood property in order to demolish it and enlarge the store and parking lot. Built in 1929, the Hollywood Hotel on the Cherry Valley Turnpike had many owners over the years. During its peak popularity it was owned by the Miller's and then Leon and Virginia Sherwood, and later James Bowmaker. For Sunday dinner, it was the "place to go." Later owners changed the name to Perillo's, Hollywood Too, Black Pearl Inn. A fire in 2004 damaged the building when an accidental blaze was sparked by a blowtorch being used for roof repairs.

Union High School was located at the end of Academy Street on land half way down the rock cut between Rockville (upstreet) and the Springs district (downstreet). The two-story school opened in 1885 and closed in 1930 when the new centralized school open. It was torn down in the 1950s.










